Donna received a grant to travel with Spark's 2011 summer Partnership Trip, during which she facilitated a classroom project with the third graders at our partner school in Zambia. Mike is a veteran poultry farmer who joined the staff of our first income-generating enterprise — a farm in Zambia that will raise over 30,000 chickens in its first year. 


For the year ended June 30, 2011

Stumbling on Spark: The Story of an Accidental Investor

Ross Parr knew little about Spark Ventures before he joined the 2011 Partnership Trip to Zambia. Now he has become one of our strongest advocates, and he took some time to share the story of the unique story of how he became a Spark investor.

How did you first learn about Spark Ventures?

I was reading the Chicago Sun-Times in a café when I came across an article about Spark's Partnership Trips. I think it was June 16th, and within a week, I had joined the trip. I wanted to get outside the processes I'd been living through over and over again, and I wanted to experience something with more profound impact.

What was your favorite part of the Partnership Trip?

I really valued seeing and learning about the poultry farm because it was amazing to see the ongoing sustainability commitment. To see that in action, this ongoing enterprise that will go on to provide for the school and orphanage, I just found very inspirational. On the emotional side, though, the best part was meeting the kids because they are really just happy, energetic, vital and great kids. Add to that that they come from abject poverty, and it's even more amazing.

Why did you choose to become an investor after returning from the trip?

Well, the way I describe it to people is that I often see two mentalities: one that profit is king and the other that profit is terrible and we need to just go out and feed all the children. I don't think one is better than the other, but I see Spark as bringing those things together in a way that makes a lot of sense. I was really surprised by the sustainability model and by how Spark brings that into what Hope can do for the children. Because of that, Spark is the only place I've found that I've been really assured that my investment can have profound impact. In the end, I think this is where money is making the most difference.

Finding Her Future: Rita's Story

In the schoolyard of Hope Community School there are countless stories of both joy and tragedy. For many students, like third-grader Rita, their lives are a combination of both, a mix of the optimism of childhood and the struggles of poverty.

For Rita, a bright and beautiful eight-year-old, the tragedy in her story came early. When she was less than two years old, her father passed away from AIDS, leaving her unskilled mother unable to care for her. Having had the rare advantage of attending a private elementary school, Rita was soon forced to leave school at age five when her mother was no longer able to afford her education on one income. An incredibly curious and smart girl, Rita refused to give up on her education, and after moving in with her grandparents, she studiously practiced the English skills she had learned in first grade with her educated grandmother, who encouraged her curiosity and determination.

Joy came again, though, when the new Shelby Goldstein Schoolhouse of Hope Community School opened just across the street from Rita and her family last year. Thrilled at the opportunity to restart the education she had to put on hold, Rita enrolled immediately. She has since become one of the strongest students in her third-grade class, and her grandmother talks with pride about how Rita is constantly reading and studying without needing the push most kids require.

Rita's love for education has no doubt been influenced by the loss of her father, as she dreams of being a doctor one day so that she can "help people stay alive." In rediscovering the joy of learning at Hope Community School, every day Rita, like her 300 fellow students, takes the steady steps to move beyond tragedy and into the possibility of a bright future.
